

"Beware the Ides of March"

On March 15, Maine Governor Janet Mills declared a civil state of emergency enabling her use of emergency powers to enhance and expedite the state's response to the outbreak of COVID-19.

Sunday morning, March 15, 2020, started out not unlike any other winter Sunday here at Sugarloaf. 58 ladies were starting in the Giant Slalom on the last day of a four day series of FIS Alpine races. The men were competing in their series at Gore Mountain, New York.

Volunteers and Competition Center staff were busy on the hill. The mountain was full of guests. The day was partly sunny with 20-35 mile an hour NW winds and temps in the teens and low 20's. Little did we know, that morning, that March 15 would be



of the Coronavirus in the US. We sensed that a crisis was building .By March 14. Swiss and French ski resorts had closed for the season. It seemed like Europe was in the middle of a health nightmare. Like dominoes, countries were starting to go into lockdown across the continent. On March 14. several Colorado ski areas announced closing for a week and then shortly after were closed for the season.

WSKI had their morning show from 7:30 to 9:00 and there was no discussion of ending our season that day. Then the proverbial shoe dropped. Late that morning the announcement was

made that Sugarloaf would be closing that afternoon for the season. The Governor was preparing to have a briefing on the status of Covid-19 in Maine.

Around 2pm the FIS Alpine race successfully came to an end and one racer, while returning her bib, was heard saying. "I just raced in the last ski race in the world for the 2020 season." She was not far off. Russia was the only country that was still running ski and snowboard competitions and they ended March 20.

At the end of the day a few volunteers gathered in the ski club office for a little socializing and the conversation mainly centered around the surrealness of the day. We seemed to be on a fast moving train with the outcome of the trip being a real mystery. Little did we know that would be our last social gathering of the kind for quite a while.

As we learned more about Covid-19 it became apparent that our day to day activities were about to face big changes. As the state shut down we were advised to limit our exposure to others who might be carrying the virus. We were glued to the news as we watched the number of cases around the world and in our country grow at an alarming rate.

The week after the mountain closed and people went home, a reversal of the exodus happened. Many of the seasonal homes began to have cars in their driveways. People were fleeing the more congested areas of our state and others to come live in our more rural area. Although we could not ski or ride on the mountain we could still get out and enjoy the many open spaces this area has to offer. Some of the x-country trails and the Narrow Gauge pathway were kept groomed. There was quite a bit of daily activity on the trails. As the snow melted away and the biking and



In a typical year the Maine Huts & Trails experience is about bringing families, friends, groups and strangers together to share adventures amidst Maine's western mountains, forests, and waters. While keeping people safe and healthy in the time of COVID meant we could not offer our traditional communal living and dining experience, at MH&T we asked ourselves what our role

could be creating safe places to find exercise and adventure.



and fat biking, XC skiing, snowshoeing, and winter walking, and we pride ourselves on sharing them with the community. On the trails, we had the incredible benefit of working together with Josh Tauses' team and the Town of Carrabassett Valley, CRNEMBA, and wonderful volunteers to clear trails and open up vistas. We installed new storage sheds at the Airport and Flagstaff Trailheads for trail partners to share. This work was made possible through the combined funding leverage of the Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund and the Town of Carrabassett Valley, for which we say, Thank You. We

shared strong backs and equipment with our Northern Forest Canoe Trail friends rebuilding a bridge and canoe landing on the Dead River. Most rewardingly, we shared many, many summertime handwaves-at-six-feet with hikers, bikers, and saunters out on the trails.

Much of the magic at Maine Huts & Trails happens at the huts, and even under the coronavirus we were able to keep creating that magic by renting Flagstaff Hut to family groups. Reservations were quickly booked from July through mid-October. Flagstaff Hut, inside and out, has been filled with shrieks of laughter, and the most difficult decision anyone has had to make during

After 65 years Tranten's store has new owners but same commitment to the community.



King's Kids is Ready For Our Third Winter!

For years, your Sugarloaf Ski Club has provided significant scholarships and funding for local kids to participate and excel in skiing and snowboarding.

For local kids 15 and under

Last winter we launched a new program with a generous \$500,000 gift from the H. King and Jean Cummings Charitable Fund. This gift is the foundation of an endowment fund for the King's Kids initiative to help kids 15 and under in Franklin and Somerset counties learn to alpine ski, snowboard, and nordic ski and to support other local initiatives.

Second year accomplishments

The fund is with the Maine Community Foundation, and last winter King's Kids funded the following:

- 84 kids from RSU 58, Stratton, and Rangeley participated in the 8-Sunday PM Boomuager program through the Sugarloaf Perfect Turn Ski School. King's Kids underwrote 75% of the cost of this program, including lift ticket, lessons, and rentals.
- King's Kids assisted the Titcomb Mtn Nana Webber learn to ski and snowboard program for RSU 9 kids

- Baker Mountain in Bingham and Spruce Mountain in Jay were given funds by King's Kids to reduce lift tickets for kids to \$5 during February vacation.
- Many local children received scholarships to Sugarloaf Mini & Bubblecuffer programs (in addition to significant monies from other club funds).
- The after school Ski & Skate Programs in Kingfield, Stratton, Strong, and Phillips each received \$500 to defray their expenses.
- Provided help to Stratton, Rangeley and RSU 58 ski teams.
- Subsidized transportation for kid's bus trips to Titcomb from Skowhegan area.

Help us grow the fund for the future.

Last winter \$20,000 from the King's Kids fund earnings supported these programs. We know participation in these programs will continue to grow, and with your help we can increase the endowment fund to \$1,000,000 (or more) which will provide funding for lots of local kids for many, many years to come.

CVA Reopening Plan

After months of careful planning and in consultation with medical professionals, the Maine Department of Education, the Maine CDC and local public health officials, Carrabassett Valley Academy was pleased to open its campus this fall. On August 30 we welcomed 71 student athletes, about half of whom are boarding students, for full-time in-person academic and athletic programming.

There is no greater priority than the health and safety of our students, staff, and local community. All CVA community members have undergone three rounds of testing and to date all results have been negative for Covid-19. Protocols have been developed for mitigating risk, controlling our environment and caring for ill community members. Daily health checks, face coverings, physical distancing, and hand hygiene are emphasized. Indoor spaces have been adjusted to allow for social distancing in classrooms, dining areas and common rooms. Outdoor classrooms and training spaces have been created to encourage outdoor learning, meeting, and training. Food service has shifted to single serve and served items and kitchen areas have been outfitted with

Plexiglas. Steps have been taken to increase ventilation in all indoor spaces and cleaning and disinfecting of high touch areas will be increased. The first day of classes and athletics for our Big Dogs looked a bit different than first days of the past, but everyone quickly adjusted to the new routine.



Kristin Littlefield,


Academic Success Program Director and English Teacher




